107/11 DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS

The Chairman reminded Councillors that previous declarations still stand.

108/11 APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Minutes of the meeting held on the 3rd March 2011 were approved as a true record and signed by the Chairman. Proposed by Councillor Strudwick and seconded by Councillor Kearney, and agreed.

109/11 REPORT FROM THE NEIGHBOURHOOD WARDENS

Anti Social Behaviour

Reports of ASB have been low again this month. However due to the nice weather there have been a few reports of groups being out and about drinking. Also we did receive a report of loud music being played from a car parked in the recreation ground car park. Young people still tend to be gathering outside the CO-OP of an evening (because it is dry, warm and out of the wind) and as a result we have increased our presence in the area as much as possible. The Wardens are still investigating the possibility of a Youth Shelter somewhere in the village. None of the shops have ever complained about the youths.

Crime Related

Ashington like many areas has been the victim of opportunistic theft this month. Over two separate nights residents of Cricketers Close and Billingshurst Road were victims. Cricketers Close had a vehicle and a garage broken into where only a few items were taken from the vehicle and thankfully the garage was empty. Billingshurst Road had a car and a couple of garages / out houses broken into. The thieves are clever in the sense they know how to overcome car locks and alarms and are very quiet, however on the flip side they are not so clever in what they are taking as they are not taking the most valuable items from any location. In response to these break-ins we sent a message out via the Ashington Newsletter and also knocked on residents doors in and around the targeted areas.

On the 7th of March we had cause to call the Police to Ashington in regard to a potential drugs deal in progress. Three known residents were seen acting suspiciously in the recreation ground car park. All details were passed to the Police however upon their arrival the individuals had already left the car park.

On the 18th March we received reports of cars speeding and driving dangerously near Billingshurst Road. We arrived to witness 3 cars involved in driving recklessly around the roundabout and were able to get the details of each car and pass them onto the police. All have been given a s59 anti-social vehicle usage warning by the Police.

Junior Wardens.

During the Month of March we have been working to try and put together a Junior Warden Manual to enable parents of Junior Wardens to see exactly what to expect. We have identified three key areas, Environment, Community and Safety. We are working on expanding this to give us a source from which to plan our activities.

Litter

Thanks to recent sunny weather the litter in the village has been pretty bad. The skate park, Turnpike Way and London Road have looked pretty bad on a day to day basis so on top of our normal litter picking we have tried to hit the hotspots more regularly (as has been possible). Equally we have noticed the play parks have been victim to more litter than normal.

Other incidents etc

Thanks to successful trial session that was held on the 24th of March we have been able to establish a new dance group that will meet on a Tuesday evening in the school hall. This is a street dance group aimed at older teenagers with the primary idea of giving them more to do in Ashington and getting them away from sitting outside the CO-OP being bored. For the trial session we had around 12-15 teenagers, including some boys, and as there was sufficient interest we will be starting a 6 week course of sessions on Tuesdays at the school to establish this new group. If the 6 sessions prove successful too this group will continue on a weekly basis.

On the 19th of March we reported a dangerous driver on the A24 to the police. They were driving towing a trailer with another car on it. The driver was all over the carriageway with no regard for which lane they were in.

During March we have noticed a number of vehicles driving in excess of the speed limits both in London Road and Billingshurst Road. It is our intention to work with the Police to try and reduce this speed by using the Speed Indicator Device and showing an increased presence in both locations.

The Chairman thanked the Wardens for their report.

Cllr Clark reported that the next meeting with the Wardens & HDC is on 12th April at 12pm in the Wardens office.

110/11 YOUNG PERSONS ADJOURNEMENT

The Clerk had received the quote for the additions to the skatepark that young people had asked for at the July 2010 Parish Council meeting. The Cost would be £12,000 for new ramps, modification to existing ramps in order to accommodate the new equipment. Councillors discussed the issue and concluded that the quote was too expensive and the village had a good skatepark for the size of population. The Wardens & Cllr Clark would speak to the young people who raised the request.

111/11 REPORT FROM DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS

District Councillor Roger Arthur reported:

1. HDC had agreed a 0% rise in Council Tax
2. The Penn Retreat planning application (DC/10/1288) would be discussed at the 17th May Committee meeting as there had been lots of questions raised and time was needed to prepare answers. The Lamorna planning application from the same applicant (DC/10/1287) would be discussed at the 19th April HDC Committee meeting.

County Councillor Frank Wilkinson reported:

1. A24 road closures were planned for both carriageways in early May. WSCC Officers had been asked to review their plans and dates as the closures would mean severe disruption locally. WSCC would also need to publicise more widely.
2. A meeting would take place in early May with officers from WSCC Education dept. to discuss s106 Education funds for Ashington. Clerk to circulate the date.

112/11 Item 1 Mill Lane flooding

Still waiting for WSCC to build up the height of the culvert wall and to install a vented/grilled manhole cover on the grass verge. County Councillor Wilkinson confirmed that the works would definitely be undertaken within 3 months.

The Environment Agency report:

1. The first occurrence of flooding that staff within our incident management team recall occurring at this location was in 1993. The permit (to Tarmac) was issued in 1986 which means that we had no prior knowledge of flooding events at this location to take into account when issuing the permit.

2. If we identify that these flows from Tarmac are having an impact we will look to contact Tarmac to determine what action to take.

3. The permit is not scheduled for review.

4. The following response is from our Development Control Team - When Ashington Bypass was constructed flood risk would have been taken into consideration by the scheme designers, particularly in respect to the design of the culvert. However, at the time of design and construction it was considered appropriate to design structures to pass the predicted 1 in 50 year flood flow, unfortunately allowances for climate change were not being taken into consideration at this time.

For your information if the road was designed to today's standards then either a clear span bridge or oversized culvert capable of passing the 1 in 100 year flood flow, including an allowance for climate change, would need to be incorporated within the design.

Our predecessors would have issued a formal Land Drainage consent for the construction of the culvert. However, the issue of the culvert's current hydraulic capacity is outside of the Agency's remit and therefore I would suggest that you contact West Sussex County Council, as the relevant Highways body, to discuss your concerns.

We are also aware that there are some surface water attenuation systems upstream (an attenuation pond and a cellular system). It may be worthwhile to contact Horsham DC building control to make sure that these are working correctly.

5. To offer help in this matter I feel it would be beneficial for communication between relevant organisations including West Sussex Highways and Horsham District Council to begin and a site meeting to be organised with yourself and those residents affected.

The Clerk has asked the EA for a meeting, to which WSCC and HDC will be invited. The Clerk has also asked the EA about the surface water attenuation systems that they refer to in their letter as we are not aware of these systems.

The Clerk has asked WSCC how long the sand quarry at Rock Common is expected to be in operation. It has planning permission until 2020 but may not extract sand for this long. It is likely that sand will continue to be extracted for a maximum of 5 years and it is possible that extraction may stop within 2 years.

121/11 PUBLIC ADJOURNMENT

1. A member of the public reported that the layby outside the shopping centre was being occupied by parked vehicles, sometimes all day. This included BT vans. The Clerk had previously asked HDC Parking Enforcement to visit the village but was unsure whether they had been. Clerk to ask again (copy to Roger Arthur).

2. A member of the public reported that there had been an incident of criminal damage to property in Penn Gardens, the culprit had been caught and the Police were dealing with the matter.
3. Members of the public reported that waste containing household & potentially hazardous items had been deposited on land adjacent to Penn Retreat. There was a potential environmental pollution risk, rats had been attracted to the waste, a smell was evident, the waste was very hot and up to 2 feet thick in places, Rabbit lorries had started arriving on site @6.45am and had disturbed residents, ditches on site had been removed, a hedgerow had been removed and new access from the highway created without planning permission, the highway & verges had been damaged by the lorries. A resident estimated that approximately 1000T of waste had been dumped on the site. The owner of the site had told the Council that he was creating a track onto the land to allow EDF access to the electricity poles on site. The Clerk reported that she had already alerted HDC Enforcement Officers, they had contacted the Environment Agency and WSCC and all were looking into this matter. HDC had issued a STOP notice for all works on the land. Clerk to pass details to Frank Wilkinson & Roger Arthur.

4. A member of the public suggested that affordable homes should be built at Penn Retreat rather than a gypsy/traveller site.

122/11 PLANNING.

The Planning Committee did not meet in March as there were no applications to discuss.

123/11 Proposed Gypsy/traveller site at Penn Retreat – DC/10/1288 Proposed stationing of 6 traveller/gypsy pitches plus outbuildings and storage area. Formation of new access and hardstanding.

The Council's planning consultant had prepared a response to the application. This was circulated to Councillors, approved and sent formally to HDC. Councillors were very pleased with this letter.

Cllrs Woolley & Norton had met with HDC Planning Officers and had discussed issues raised at the various Parish Council meetings. Some issues were planning matters, others could be dealt with by planning conditions and other issues were not planning matters (eg Police issues).

Cllr Stillwell reported that a number of residents had telephoned the Planning Officer as they were afraid to write to HDC for fear of intimidation. Cllr Arthur suggested that residents could email members of HDC's planning committee 2-3 days before the planning committee meeting as it was unlikely that these emails would be published in the public domain. The Clerk would send out a link to the HDC planning committee email address.

132/11 Contract Reviews:

Clerk - That the Council reviews the salary and hours worked of Karen Dare Parish Clerk currently SCP29 (£12.810 per hour or £7993.44 per annum, 12 hours per week). SCP30 would result in £267.70 additional expenditure (£13.239 per hour or £8261.14

per annum). The Clerk is happy to remain on 12 hours per week. Agreed by all.

133/11 Correspondence

No information has been received from WSCC Pension Fund about the likely cost of Ill Health retirement.

KD C/F

Consider a request from Horsham Museum to contribute to the purchase of a medieval silver gilt ring found in Ashington. The ring has an image of a Saint on it. The ring is valued at £300 – Horsham Museum does not have the funds to buy the ring outright and are asking if the Parish Council would be willing to go 50% (£150) on the ring. It will then put it on display in the village hall as part of a temporary exhibition. The History Group have indicated to the Clerk that they would be willing to contribute some funds to the purchase. Not agreed – the Council did not consider it appropriate to spend Council funds on this item which has no specific link to Ashington and could set a precedent for purchasing other historical items that could come to light in the future. A local resident had indicated he may be able to offer financial assistance. Clerk to inform Horsham Museum.

Consider a quote for dredging the Church Close pond - £5301.81 exc VAT. The pond desperately needs dredging as current water levels are only a few inches and the reeds are taking over the pond (reeds grow in shallow water). The pond is not currently acting as a balancing pond as it has insufficient capacity to manage surface water. The quote is from the company who did a good job dredging the Posthorses pond in 2009 and proved to be highly competitive in price. The works would take place Spring/Summer this year, silt would be spread on adjacent grassed areas, negating the need to pay for it to be taken away and allowing any creatures to find their way back into the pond. The cost would need to be taken from Developers lump sums held by the Council. The Clerk explained that the Council was holding funds for exactly this purpose and that it should not consider applying for a grant for the works as this would be unethical. The Council has a duty to maintain the pond and the works are not optional. Agreed by a majority.

Consider a request from Horsham CAB for a donation towards running their outreach service in Storrington. Not agreed.

Friends of Lodge Hill Newsletter March 2011 and a request to renew the Council's subscription (£45). Councillors agreed to renew the subscription using s137 expenditure powers and that the level of expenditure is commensurate with the benefit. Agreed by all.

Review of SALC/NALC Subscriptions – the cost of subscriptions has increased by 10% this year. Councillors previously asked the Clerk to monitor how much the Council used the services offered: the Clerk is a regular user of the SALC website (advice, legal

updates, training info, QPC information) and the Clerk has sought the advice of SALC once during the past year. It was agreed that with the new Localism Bill on the Government's agenda it was more important than ever to make use of the services offered by SALC.

Cllr Clark had been asked by WSCC Youth Service to organise a meeting between the Parish Council, Youth Club and WSCC to discuss the provision of Youth Services in the village. Cllr Clark reported that WSCC were cutting funding for Youth Workers to zero from September. Cllr Clark to circulate dates. **NCI C/F**

Cllr Kearney volunteered to clear the remaining salt bags from Rectory Close.

Cllr Brennan reported that in his opinion the new speed limit on Billingshurst Road had made little difference to traffic speeds. WSCC would be conducting a survey 12 months after the speed limit had been reduced to see what impact it had.

Cllr Brennan asked why a new on-test average speed camera had been installed on the A24 southbound carriageway at Southwater – a location with few reported accidents rather than at a location where there had been a number of accidents. Clerk to ask County Councillor Wilkinson. **KD D**

The Clerk reported that she had received a very short petition from a resident asking for a handrail to be installed at the steep section of the east side nature trail (to the south of the footbridge). The Clerk would investigate costs and present at a future meeting. **KD C/F**
